# Top team's happy holiday

A TEAM of doctors and nurses from Nepean Hospital recently returned from a two-week "medical vacation" in Bangladesh.

The AussiBangla Smile team is a voluntary medical team that has visited Bangladesh for the past three years to perform free surgical operations for underprivileged children and adults.

The patients were born with cleft lips and palates and required facial reconstructive surgery.

Bangladeshi-born Dr Hasan Sarwar, who practises at Nepean Hospital.

For Dr Sarwar, a chance to return to his home country and help his people regain their lives was an honour.

‘It only costs around \$200, in-

cluding all medical supplies and after care, in order for a child to be given the chance to smile,” he said.

The AussiBangla Smile team paid its own way and brought supplies in order to perform 100 reconstruction surgeries at

no expense to patients' families.

Cleft lips and palates are extremely rare conditions in Australia. Most children born with cleft receive plastic surgery almost immediately to correct the condition.

But in Bangladesh people born with cleft palates often become ostracised from their communities because of poverty and a lack of doctors and general supplies.
