Demographics

Population

An estimated 1,124,250 people lived in the health area in 2006. This represents 16.4 per cent of the estimated population of NSW and 19.1 per cent of the population are aged 75 years or more. This age range is significant because older age groups need considerably more health care than the general population.

By the year 2011, it is estimated that the population will have grown to more than 1,162,210. The '75 years and over' population in NSCCH will have grown to more than 20 per cent of the New South Wales population in that age group. It is expected that there will be 28.8 per cent more people in the '85 and over' age group in 2011 than there were in 2001. The other age group expected to grow the most over the period to 2011 is the 'late working age-early retirement' group aged between 60 and 69 years. It is expected that by 2011 there will be 15,700 more people age 60-64 years (25%) and 9,600 more people aged 65-69 years (19.4% increase).

Multicultural Profile

The Central Coast Health Service has a different multicultural profile from the remainder of NSCCH. Central Coast Health Service has only 4.5 per cent of its population born in a non-English speaking country. In the remainder of NSCCH 18% of residents were born outside English speaking countries. The country of birth data are also reflected in the language preferences of residents. In the metropolitan health services, 76% of the population speaks only English. In the Central Coast Health Service 92 per cent of the population reported only speaking English at the 2001 Census.

Cantonese, Italian, Mandarin, Korean, Japanese, Arabic, Greek, German, Spanish, Tagalog and Persian are the most reported languages other than English spoken in NSCCH. Ryde and Willoughby were the local government areas with the highest proportion of residents who reported speaking a language other than English.

Health Status of residents

The mortality rate for NSCCH residents is significantly lower than for the whole of NSW, indicating a better health status. In 2003, there were 8,101 deaths among NSCCH residents. Cardiovascular disease was the most common overall cause of death among NSCCH residents in 2003 accounting for 40.2% of all deaths. This profile remains current. Cancers were the second most common cause of death in 2003, being attributed as the cause of death of 27.1% of deaths. For males, the main sites were the lungs, prostate and colon. For females, the main sites were breast, lungs and colon. This profile remains current.

Section 3 – Moving to the Region

If you're planning to move yourself or your whole family to NSW to work with NSCCH, you will need to find out about key services like housing, transport and work.

The more time you put into planning, the easier it will be to relocate to the area. Please ensure you give yourself plenty of time to make the required arrangements prior to moving to the area.

Salary Packaging

Salary packaging is a fringe benefit system whereby a portion of an employee's gross salary (up to \$9095) can be claimed. The Department of Health (DOH) has offered the scheme to staff provided that benefits are shared equally between the Area Health Service and the employee on a 50/50 basis. There is also an annual administration fee apportioned fortnightly.

Under Salary Packaging, you may be eligible for a **Relocation Allowance for Sponsored Personnel** or **Living Away From Home Allowance**

Finding Accommodation

Finding accommodation can be a stressful time when relocating to the region. Currently in the Northern Sydney and Central Coast area there is a rental shortage and it can be difficult to find a suitable property. It is recommended that you begin your search as early as possible as most real estates advertise their properties well in advance.

It is important that you or someone you trust view the property before committing to a rental lease. Most real estate agents will not rent you a place without you first viewing the accommodation. Prior to moving, you should arrange to visit the local area to look for where you want to live. You should consider such things as:

- Distance from the hospital
- Transport options walking/cycling distance, public transport
- Distance from schools, childcare
- Social activities available sporting clubs, night life, beaches, cycle ways, open spaces etc

When moving to the area from overseas, you should arrange to spend approximately 1 month in temporary accommodation while you are looking for longer term accommodation.

Novated Lease

Novated leasing is another form of financing a car. The principle of a novated lease is that the car is privately purchased, used and maintained by the staff member. It is purchased under a financial lease. The word novated means that NSCCH agrees to pay for all the costs of the car out of a staff member's pre-tax salary while ever they are employed and the lease is current.

Personal Health Care

Doctors or general practitioners (GPs) are located in every town and centre to treat everyday illnesses and refer patients to specialists for additional treatment if necessary. GPs are listed under 'Medical Practitioner' in the Yellow Pages telephone directory - Yellow Pages online.

It is recommended that all people have a regular GP. Due to the shortage of GP's, it is a little harder to find one of these but the key is persistence. We would encourage you to ring a number of practices to outline your situation and to not be discouraged if turned away a couple of times. Asking friends and colleagues to recommend a GP or a practice is also worth doing.

Some areas have after hours GP facilities. Speak to your local GP practice about after hours practices in your area.

Private health Insurance

Staff on temporary visa's are not covered by Medicare and will need to take out their own private health insurance for the duration of their appointment.

If you haven't yet applied for permanent residency in Australia or if you come here on a temporary visa, you must purchase health insurance cover to protect yourself and your family for any unforeseen medical expenses.

The NSW Medical Registration Board

Once you have arrived in Australia you must present in person to the Medical Board in Sydney before commencing work. You must take all relevant and requested information with you and have cash or a credit card to pay them. Foreign currency and traveller's cheques will NOT be accepted.




NEW SOUTH WALES MEDICAL BOARD MAP OF LOCATION

Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency

To be eligible for employment as a nurse or midwife in New South Wales you must be registered with the <u>Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency</u>, (AHPRA) telephone +61 2 1300 419 495. AHPRA will assess overseas nursing and midwifery qualifications for eligibility for registration in NSW. Hospitals require evidence of current registration as a nurse or midwife in New South Wales before they make a job offer.

Overseas nurses and midwives (with the exception of those holding New Zealand passports) must also hold a visa that permits work. The Department of Immigration and Citizenship provides information about entry to Australia. The NSW Department of Health may be able to assist with sponsorship for employment in a NSW public hospital.
